As the spring term is now firmly underway, I wanted to draw your notice to a few events in school and to also update you on some government initiatives.

Ygam

Ygam is a charity which supports schools in delivering evidence led education to help prevent gaming and gambling harms. As a school we have worked with Ygam for a number of years. You may be wondering what this has to do with parents of primary aged children; well, gaming and gambling harms can begin at a very young age. Consider:

What might influence a young person to gamble? What is a loot box? Why are in-game items so important to my child?

Attendance

You may have heard of the new government initiative: Moments Matter/ Attendance Counts. Here are some facts from the government to share:

The link between attendance and attainment is clear:

- In 2018/19, just 40% of persistently absent (PA) children in KS2 achieved expected KS2 standards, compared with 84% of pupils who were regular attenders. (Persistent absence is having an attendance of 90% or lower.)
- And 36% of PA children in KS4 got 9 to 4 (grades) in their English and maths GCSEs, also compared with 84% of regular attenders.

And it's never too late to benefit from good attendance:

• More than half (54%) of pupils who were PA in Year 10 and then rarely absent in Year 11, passed at least 5 GCSEs, compared to 36% of pupils who were persistently absent in both years.

But attendance is important for more than just attainment:

• Regular school attendance can facilitate positive peer relationships, which is a protective factor for mental health and wellbeing.

In support of good attendance at school, the UK Health Security Agency (UKHSA) are reminding parents of back to school advice amid rising levels of winter illness.
